- 1. The list of Council preparatory bodies is attached in  $\underline{\text{Annex } I}^{1}$ .
- 2. <u>Annex II</u> sets out certain security requirements governing access to meetings, in particular where classified information is discussed. For preparatory bodies marked with a single asterisk, all delegates should have a valid EU personnel security clearance at least to the level SECRET UE/EU SECRET. For preparatory bodies marked with a double asterisk, all delegates should have a valid EU Personnel Security Clearance at least to the level CONFIDENTIEL UE/EU CONFIDENTIAL<sup>2</sup>. Any new delegates should be security cleared to the appropriate level as soon as possible.

This list does not include Joint Committees and other bodies with third countries. Nor does it include certain bodies (e.g. the Schengen Joint Supervisory Authority, COST and the Standing Committee on Employment) which, although they meet in the Council building, are not Council preparatory bodies.

These references in Annex I cancel and replace document 8683/05 + COR 1.

- 3. <u>Annex III</u> lists all the preparatory bodies with a fixed chair (i.e. committees or working parties with an elected/appointed chair, chaired by a representative of the High Representative or chaired by the General Secretariat of the Council).
- 4. Committees or Working Parties may only be set up by, or with the approval of, the Council or COREPER. Only the committees and Working Parties on this list may meet as Council preparatory bodies (Article 19(3) of the Council's Rules of Procedure).
- 5. Substantial and important new technical proposals requiring specific expertise should, as a rule, be included within the remit of the competent existing Working Party. If necessary for practical reasons a specific sub-area may be listed rather than creating a new permanent or *ad hoc* Working Party. The listing of sub-areas does *not* imply that Working Party remits are confined to the sub-areas in question; Working Parties cover any other matters falling within their general scope. The decision to list such sub-areas may be made by the Presidency on the basis of practical need.
- 6. *Ad hoc* Working Parties cease to exist once their terms of reference have been fulfilled. Their terms of reference should expressly state this rule or be time-limited.
- 7. Meetings should only be convened when a sufficiently substantive agenda exists or objective deadlines so require.

<sup>(</sup>b) CATS/SCIFA shall focus its discussions on strategic issues where COSI would not be able to contribute and meet as necessary, as convened by the Presidency.

<sup>(</sup>c) CATS/SCIFA could be involved, when deemed appropriate, in legislative work. COREPER shall remain solely responsible for preparing legislative acts. In November 2011 CRP decided that CATS and SCIFA will continue to meet under new guidelines until a further evaluation is taken (cf. doc. 17182/11 and 17187/11)

## ACCESS CONTROLS AND SECURITY PROCEDURES FOR MEETINGS OF COUNCIL PREPARATORY BODIES

#### Access controls

1. Access checks will be conducted at the entrance to certain meetings. Random access checks may be performed at other meetings. Delegates' identification badges must be worn visibly. The Security Office may deny access to any delegate unable to produce his or her identification badge. Holders of day badges will only be admitted if their badges specifically authorise attendance at the meeting.

#### Discussion of classified items

2. All discussion of classified items must be organised in accordance with the Council's security rules for protecting EU classified information<sup>1</sup>.

#### SECRET UE/EU SECRET

3. Discussion of items involving information classified SECRET UE/EU SECRET must <u>always</u> take place in the room designated for this purpose. No electronic devices (including mobile phones) may be taken into the room. Delegations will be reminded of the security clearance requirement for the item in question in advance in the notice convening the meeting. Delegates' Personnel Security Clearance Certificate (PSCC)<sup>2</sup> is to be forwarded by the appropriate national authorities, the Commission Security Directorate or the EEAS Security Office to the GSC Security Office (e-mail: securite.habilitations@consilium.europa.eu). Exceptionally proof of clearance must be presented by the delegate concerned. The GSC Security Office will control access for that item with the assistance of the Secretariat official responsible for servicing the meeting. The Security Office is instructed not to allow any exceptions.

#### CONFIDENTIEL UE/EU CONFIDENTIAL

4. Discussion of items involving information classified CONFIDENTIEL UE/EU CONFIDENTIAL may take place in any meeting room. Delegations will be reminded of the security clearance requirement for the item in question in advance in the notice convening the meeting. Delegates' Personnel Security Clearance Certificate (PSCC) is to be forwarded by the appropriate national authorities, the Commission Security Directorate or the EEAS Security Office to the GSC Security Office (e-mail: securite.habilitations@consilium.europa.eu), or exceptionally be presented by the delegate concerned. The chair will inform individuals present that they must leave the room if they are not in possession of an appropriate security clearance and will instruct delegations and interpreters to switch off all electronic devices (portable computers, mobile phones, PDAs, etc.) for the duration of the item. The GSC Security Office will conduct spot checks with the assistance of the GSC official servicing the meeting where such items are on the agenda.
